

I hope that everyone enjoyed the first full month of fall. We continued to conduct "Cop on a Corner" briefings throughout the area command. Although we have seen some involvement from the community we would like to see more of you come out to meet our officers. These events will give you the opportunity to attend police field briefings where you can interact with the officers assigned to your neighborhoods and provide in part information and ask questions. The briefings will serve as a way to exchange information. It is also an opportunity for officers to provide you with crime prevention tips and tools. We will be sending out flyers with the locations and times of our next two events.



During the month of October we saw some decrease on our aggravated assaults from our previous month, however, our robberies do continue to rise. Overall we do continue to see increases in our violent crimes. However, we also had another decrease on our overall numbers for property crimes. We saw an increase in burglaries of storage units and are working on operations to address those.

On the last weekend of October, we unfortunately had yet another shooting in one of our neighborhoods which occurred as a result of a large party where numerous rounds were fired and several homes and vehicles were struck. Four individuals were injured and luckily no one was killed. I would like to remind everyone that you need to be very vigilant if you are going to host any kind of party. I want to stress this again, we are going to hold those homeowners who create an environment that will lead to violence accountable. We will be doing outreach throughout the area command with parents and youth alike. We do not want to discourage people from having a good time with friends and family, but please do it responsibly. If you do plan to host a party remember that you could possibly be held liable for what happens at those parties. Do not allow underage drinking, do not allow individuals who are armed into your party, and ensure that you know who is attending. Again we do not want to discourage or encourage people to have parties. We just want everyone to be responsible and to stay safe.

I would like to please encourage everyone to take part in the Community Policing Council (CPC) and your neighborhood associations. NORTHWEST AREA COMMAND WATCH I LT. JIM EDISON



October saw the continuation of a disturbing trend across the city on graveyard shift, including in the Northwest Area Command. Armed, uninvited subjects were appearing at house parties thrown by juveniles and young adults, initiating fights with the other party-goers, and then shooting at the dwellings while fleeing the scene. In the Northwest, this scenario played out in two otherwise quiet neighborhoods. The incidents are currently under investigation and it has not been determined whether they are related. For safety and crime prevention, as well as personal liability, it is highly recommended that all citizens refrain from making "open invitations" to parties online through social media, snapchat, etc and only allow people they know and trust inside their homes at any time.

In better news, the International Balloon Fiesta resumed for 2021! For Watch I, this included continuing our efforts to discourage auto thefts and burglaries while our many out-of-town guests were enjoying their stay in Albuquerque. These efforts appeared to pay off, as we did not see the dramatic spike in auto thefts and burglaries that have sometimes occurred in the past during the Fiesta.

NORTHWEST AREA COMMAND WATCH II LT. Kevin Napoleone

October was a very productive month for the NW area command and the department. We successfully navigated through Balloon Fiesta and the increased traffic it brings to our city. Northwest dayshift Officers successfully conducted periodic watches to protect vehicles and patrons at the park and ride for the fiesta. Officers on watch II (dayshift) will continue with the POP plan initiated last bid at the West Bluff business area. Although Officers on watch II have been directed to continue the enforcement and proactivity in the West Bluff Area, they are also continuing enforcement throughout the entire area command. Several felony arrests were made in the month of October in the West Bluff area. From auto thefts to robberies, our officers were able to take these perpetrators off the street. I am proud of the Officers and Sergeants who work for me and look forward to making this city safer every day.

With the upcoming cold weather comes the increase of vehicles being stolen while warming up. Please do not leave your vehicle running with no one in it, this makes an easy target for thieves looking to steal vehicles.

Holiday Crime Prevention Tips While Shopping

- Stay alert to your surroundings and the people around you.
- Avoid carrying large amounts of cash.
- If you carry a purse, place the straps around your shoulders.

- Have your car keys ready in hand before leaving the store.

Holiday Crime Prevention Tips In Parking Lots:

- Shop early and leave early to avoid evening darkness.
- Park in a high visibility area and check for lighting in case you leave during hours of darkness.
- Prior to arriving at the shopping center, lock all your valuables in the trunk of your vehicle.

Council Membership

Each of the six Community Policing Councils is composed of members from the community and voting members. Voting members must reside within or have businesses within the boundaries of their area command.

All attendees (members) are encouraged to submit recommendations, provide input concerning recommendations, ask questions and submit topics for discussion.

Outreach:

APD'S COAST Outreach (Crisis Outreach and Support Team):

The COAST team continues to work with the West Side Homeless shelter, service providers and Field Officers to ensure that the homeless and most vulnerable are being offered shelter and resources. Service providers are continuing to do homeless outreach throughout the City.

Cop on the Corner Event:

The Albuquerque Police Department launched a new program called "Cop on the Corner" to help build relationships with the communities where officers patrol. The program will give people the opportunity to attend police field briefings where they can interact with the officers assigned to their neighborhoods. The day shift officers and swing shift officers held briefings at two neighborhood parks.

The day shift briefing was held on October 20, 2021 at 7:00am. The briefing was held at the East Atrisco Park, in the S.R. Marmon neighborhood.

The swing shift briefing was held on October 20, 2021 at 2:30pm. The briefing was held at the Shawn McWethy Park, in the Tres Vocanes neighborhood.

Business Coalition meetings:

We have three community business locations. The Westside area businesses, Riverside area businesses and the Cottonwood area businesses. The meetings were held in August, September and October. We are working with the businesses to identify and reduce criminal activity. In the meetings we will identify the business stake holders that will be involved, concerns on any type of criminal activity. We will talk about resources that can be used to deter and reduce criminal activity and provide crime prevention training, business security assessments and educate the businesses concerning property crimes.

The West Bluff business coalition was held on October 27, 2021, at the Ladera Golf Course meeting room.

Crime Prevention:

Establish neighborhood watch programs in the NW Area Command. A block captains will be assigned and function as the neighborhood leader. Each neighborhood watch block captain will have a police officer assigned to them.

ADAPT Program (Abandoned & Dilapidated Abatement Property Team):

The program identifies and addresses abandoned and /or dilapidated properties that become public nuisance because they have a pattern of calls for service, serious criminal activity or because they pose a public safety threat. The goal is to work with property owners to increase the health, safety, and welfare of the buildings and the community. Making our community a safe environment for us to enjoy. Through community policing we will reduce crime and increase quality of life in the area.







The Northwest Problem Response Team is constantly working to build positive relationships with the community through community outreach, tac plans with local businesses, and events with youth centers and schools.

In the month of October, Officers Sean Morper and Patrick Garcia attended a week long internationally recognized bike class. The bikes were purchased for the NW PRT by the office of City Councilor Sena. The advantages of the officers being able to patrol areas within the NW area command on a bike will be greatly recognized leading into the holiday shopping season. The presence of officers in shopping areas will not only increase a police presence but will also make the officers more approachable to the public.

Within certain areas of the NW area command, there have been growing concerns with interactions involving the homeless community. NW PRT officers have addressed these issues with several community meetings both between business owners as well as residents in the area command. A number of resources have been brought into the area by the NW PRT both to assist individuals that are in need of resources and at the same time addressing the concerns of the residents in the area. These operations are ongoing as the needs of the community change over time.



With the Holiday Season approaching, the PRT has started making plans to get ahead of issues and concerns that historically are likely to see in the high shopping areas within the NW Area Command. The planned increase of patrols utilizing the new bikes will be instrumental in these plans and continue to provide a safe environment throughout the NW Area Command.
